## TOM RENICK COUNTY PARK BIRD COUNTS - DECEMBER, 2023

Another year is completed (eight in all). This month there were 31 surveys over 188 hours. In all for the month 126 species seen this equals the record set in 2021. There was one addition to the list bringing the list up to 326. For the year 275 species seen this is a record.

Single Red-throated Loons were seen on the 7<sup>th</sup>, 20<sup>th</sup>, 21<sup>st</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup>. In contrast Common Loons were seen on 17 days with three on the 20<sup>th</sup> and three on the 21<sup>st</sup>. There was a Horned Grebe on the 4<sup>th</sup>. There were two Manx Shearwaters on the 21<sup>st</sup> with a first winter Masked Booby flying to the south on the 25<sup>th</sup>. Northern Gannets peaked at 386 on the 14<sup>th</sup> and 867 on the 25<sup>th</sup>. American White Pelicans were seen on seven days with ten on the 6<sup>th</sup>, 14 on the 15<sup>th</sup> and 44 on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. Brown Pelicans peaked at 267 on the 13<sup>th</sup> and 458 on the 25<sup>th</sup>. Double-crested Cormorants peaked at 162 on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. There were two Magnificent Frigatebirds on the 17<sup>th</sup> with one on the 24<sup>th</sup> (the latter was circling over the river).

There was a Reddish Egret on the 8<sup>th</sup>. White Ibis peaked at 75 on the 6<sup>th</sup>. There was a Glossy Ibis on the 6<sup>th</sup> with six on the 20<sup>th</sup>. There were six Roseate Spoonbills on the 8<sup>th</sup> with 15 on the 18<sup>th</sup>, then three seen on the 19<sup>th</sup>. Wood Storks peaked at 12 on the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19 on the 7<sup>th</sup>. For the vultures the peak counts were: for the Black 102 on the 27<sup>th</sup> and for the Turkey 403 on the 5<sup>th</sup>.

There was a Snow Goose on the 10<sup>th</sup> with two Canada Geese on the 15<sup>th</sup>. There was a Gadwall on the 11<sup>th</sup>. There was also a Mallard on the 17<sup>th</sup>. There were two Mottled Ducks on the 20<sup>th</sup>. There were six Northern Pintail on the 14<sup>th</sup>. For the Green-winged Teal there were 20 on the 5<sup>th</sup> with one on the 7<sup>th</sup>. There were two Canvasbacks on the 3<sup>rd</sup> with five on the 10<sup>th</sup>, seven on the 14<sup>th</sup> and eight on the 26<sup>th</sup>. There were 20 Redheads on the 14<sup>th</sup> with ten on the 21<sup>st</sup>. There were 25 Ring-necked Ducks on the 5<sup>th</sup> with four on the 13<sup>th</sup>. Greater Scaup peaked at 2,520 (over the sea) on the 14<sup>th</sup> and Lesser Scaup peaked at 1,700 (over the river) on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. There was a Common Eider on the 14<sup>th</sup>. Surf Scoters were seen on 16 dates with 18 on the 23<sup>rd</sup> and 25 on the 15<sup>th</sup>. For the White-winged Scoter there were five on the 6<sup>th</sup>, two on the 10<sup>th</sup>, 23 on the 14<sup>th</sup> (a new high count), seven on the 15<sup>th</sup> and seven again on the 21<sup>st</sup>. Black Scoters peaked at 590 on the 18<sup>th</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup>. There were three Hooded Mergansers on the 7<sup>th</sup> with four on the 13<sup>th</sup>. Red-breasted Mergansers peaked at 119 on the 15<sup>th</sup> and 148 on the 14<sup>th</sup>. There was also a Ruddy Duck on the 21<sup>st</sup>.

Up to three Bald Eagles seen daily. There were single Northern Harriers on the 3<sup>rd</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup>, 13<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup>. There was a Sharp-shinned Hawk on the 6<sup>th</sup>. On the 18<sup>th</sup> there was a spectacular event I was able to watch an adult Bald Eagle chase an adult Golden Eagle all over the sky. An American Kestrel was present all month. There were single Merlin on the 8<sup>th</sup>, 15<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup>.

There was an American Coot on the 12<sup>th</sup>. There was a Killdeer on the 10<sup>th</sup>. On the 10<sup>th</sup> there was also an American Oystercatcher. There were 44 Red Knot on the 8<sup>th</sup> with five on the 9<sup>th</sup>. They were then seen daily from the 17<sup>th</sup> with 120 on the 20<sup>th</sup>.

There were four Pomarine Jaegers on the 6<sup>th</sup> with three on the 15<sup>th</sup>. Singles were then seen regularly from the 19<sup>th</sup> with two on the 21<sup>st</sup>. There were five Parasitic Jaegers on the 6<sup>th</sup> with one on the 7<sup>th</sup>. Up to ten a day seen from the 12<sup>th</sup> with 29 on the 16<sup>th</sup> and 37 on the 28<sup>th</sup>. Laughing Gulls peaked at 2,980 on the 13<sup>th</sup> and 3,870 on the 28<sup>th</sup>. There were single Franklin's Gulls on the 13<sup>th</sup> and the 14<sup>th</sup>. Ring-billed Gulls peaked at 380 on the 29<sup>th</sup>. There was an adult California Gull at the river on the 26<sup>th</sup>. Herring Gulls peaked at 250 on the 31<sup>st</sup>. Lesser Blackbacked Gulls were seen on nine days with seven on the 13<sup>th</sup> and 13 on the 25<sup>th</sup>. There were single first-winter Glaucous Gulls on the 25<sup>th</sup> and the 28<sup>th</sup>. There were two Black-legged Kittiwakes on the 14<sup>th</sup>. There were single Caspian Terns on the 1<sup>st</sup> and the 17<sup>th</sup>. Royal Terns peaked at 95 on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. Sandwich Terns peaked at 141 on the 19<sup>th</sup> and 145 on the 21<sup>st</sup>. There was a Common Tern on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. Forster's Terns peaked at 84 on the 19<sup>th</sup> and 93 on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. Black Skimmers were seen on 16 days with a peak count of 357 on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. For the auks there was a Thick-billed Murre on the 20<sup>th</sup> with single Razorbills on the 25<sup>th</sup> and the 31<sup>st</sup>.

There were single Eastern Screech-Owls on the 23<sup>rd</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup> with single Great Horned Owls on the 5<sup>th</sup> and the 26<sup>th</sup>. There was a Belted Kingfisher on the 3<sup>rd</sup>. Single Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers were seen on the 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup>. Up to two Downy Woodpeckers were seen on ten days. Up to two Pileated Woodpeckers were seen on 11 days. There were four Eastern Phoebe on the 1<sup>st</sup> with five on the 3<sup>rd</sup> then up to two a day seen to the end of the month. Two Loggerhead Shrikes were present all month with counts of three on the 13<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup>. There was also a Blue-headed Vireo on the 3<sup>rd</sup>.

American Crows peaked at 18 on the 13<sup>th</sup> a new high count. There were eight Tree Swallows on the 2<sup>nd</sup> with four on the 3<sup>rd</sup>. There were single House Wrens on the 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup>. There were single Blue-gray Gnatcatchers on the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup>. There was a Golden-crowned Kinglet on the 9<sup>th</sup> a new species for the park. Ruby-crowned Kinglets noted on six dates with three on the 23<sup>rd</sup> a new high count. American Robins peaked at 1,865 on the 27<sup>th</sup> and 2,550 on the 29<sup>th</sup>. There were three Gray Catbirds on the 1<sup>st</sup> with two from the 3<sup>rd</sup> to the 9<sup>th</sup> then one seen on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. European Starlings peaked at 1,070 on the 20<sup>th</sup> and 1,160 on the 17<sup>th</sup>. There were two American Pipits on the 19<sup>th</sup>.

There was an Orange-crowned Warbler on the 9<sup>th</sup>. There were two Cape May Warblers on the 3<sup>rd</sup> with singles on the 8<sup>th</sup>, 23<sup>rd</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup>. There were single Yellow-throated Warblers on the 1<sup>st</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup>, 12<sup>th</sup>, 20<sup>th</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup>. There was also a Prairie Warbler on the 23<sup>rd</sup>.

Common Grackles peaked at 41 on the 31<sup>st</sup>. Brown-headed Cowbirds peaked at 210 on the 14<sup>th</sup>, 260 on the 20<sup>th</sup>, 360 on the 27<sup>th</sup> and 520 on the 28<sup>th</sup>. Up to five House Finches seen daily. There was an American Goldfinch on the 8<sup>th</sup> with 30 on the 10<sup>th</sup>, 28 on the 11<sup>th</sup> and 18 on the 12<sup>th</sup>.

So, what will 2024 bring? There were a very high 13 additions to the list in 2023, surely there will be only a few new species in 2024.
