

## AUDUBON PARK BIRD COUNTS – FEBRUARY, 2015

Another cold and miserable month when will the “winter” end? Eight of the 17 mornings were cold with a low temperature of 29 degrees at first light on the 20<sup>th</sup>. At least the first week of March appears to be warmer. It has rained regularly which means that the marsh has stayed full.

The surprise of the month was a River Otter which visited the impoundments from the 10<sup>th</sup> to at least the 20<sup>th</sup>; that is a first record for the survey. Up to five White-tailed Deer have been seen during the month.

Now to the birds there were 19 American White Pelicans on the 1<sup>st</sup> with 12 on the 14<sup>th</sup>; these were flying over. The Green Heron was last seen on the 4<sup>th</sup>. The only sighting of Black-bellied Whistling-Ducks involves two on the 16<sup>th</sup>. A Northern Harrier flew to the north on the 6<sup>th</sup>. A light morph Short-tailed Hawk was present on the 12<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> but the weather since then has not been suitable for these raptors.

To my surprise an adult Common Gallinule (Moorhen) took up residence from the 12<sup>th</sup> to at least the 26<sup>th</sup>. I managed to disturb an American Woodcock from the south-western end of the marsh on the 16<sup>th</sup>. A Forster’s Tern visited from time to time from the 3<sup>rd</sup> to the 20<sup>th</sup>. An Eastern Whip-poor-will was seen or heard on six dates during the month. The only new bird for the month (number 201) a Vesper Sparrow was seen on the 12<sup>th</sup>. Finally there was a male Painted Bunting on the 23<sup>rd</sup>.

There were a number of “highest counts” this month: there were 283 Black Vultures on the 17<sup>th</sup> and 1037 Turkey Vultures on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. A total of 127 Sandhill Cranes seen on the 16<sup>th</sup> only a few were in the area. Tree Swallows peaked at 6860 on the 1<sup>st</sup> with 6000 again on the 16<sup>th</sup>. Finally there were ten Savannah Sparrows on the 28<sup>th</sup>. On the 1<sup>st</sup> I saw 9740 birds that is also a high count.

I decided to end on an up note despite the weather (it is raining as I write this). At the end of the month on the 28<sup>th</sup> a Northern Parula was singing and a pair of Sandhill Cranes had two tiny chicks by the marsh.
